WITH the Centro Emerald Market and Centro Emerald Village now under new ownership by Sentinel Property Group, the group's adjunct professor Michael Sherlock decided to come to Emerald and have a look around.

Sentinel purchased the two shopping centres from Centro, and Mr Sherlock said the group had plans to fix up the centres and make them a more pleasurable shopping experience.

"Instead of spending \$1000 on one thing, we will spend \$100 on 10 things," Mr Sherlock said.

The group was in town to chat to local business owners who have shops in the centres, and gave them a chance to tell the company what they would do to improve the centres.
