AS traditional retailers take some solace from April's improved trade figures, the push towards online spending con-

tinues apace.
The \$30 billion online retail industry is expected to grow to \$36 billion by 2013.

And riding on the tail of that growth is the Brisbane-based MegaBuy Group.

Specialising in IT hardware products, founders Karpowicz, 41, and Nick Shelomanov, 28, said their focus on a niche service to small business had helped them more than double their revenue each year since launching their website in 2007.
